In 2019, we changed our abbreviation from ABP to ABPath, a simple, but important distinction from the other ABP, the American Board of Pediatrics. Our 2019 goals included improved communications and customer service, which has been enhanced by having a full-time Director of Communications, giving us a presence on social media, improving our website, and enhancing communications with our candidates and diplomates. In 2019, we put final touches on our strategic plan, with goals listed in this report.

2019 was a big year for the American Board of Medical Specialties and its Member Boards with the release of the "Continuing Board Certification: Vision for the Future Commission Recommendations". One of the principal recommendations was for boards to commit to longitudinal formative assessments and offer an alternative to the high-stakes, point-in-time examinations. Prior to the report, ABPath had already launched the ABPath CertLink® pilot in July of 2018 as an anticipated replacement for the Continuing Certification (CC) Part III exam. This program, which has been an incredible change and innovation, supports continuous professional development that is flexible and relevant to

pathologists, while meeting the public’s expectation that assessment of a physician’s knowledge should be continuous. ABPath CertLink has received an overwhelmingly positive response from our diplomates. It will be a valid assessment for making summative decisions about a diplomate’s medical knowledge, judgment, and skills in the future. Another key Commission recommendation was to support learning activities that produce advances in clinical practice. ABPath collaborates with our specialty societies, CME providers, and other stakeholders to meet this objective. Through the relationship with these fine organizations, our CC Program accepts a wide range of educational and quality assessment activities in which our diplomates can engage.

The remarkable changes and evolution of the ABPath could not have happened without the commitment of time and expertise from our volunteers, including our Trustees, Test Development and Advisory Committee members, CertLink volunteer item writers, CC Advisory and Resident and Fellow Advisory Committees, and our diplomates. # 2019 Highlights

## Introduction of Certification Mark to Display Your Certification Status

The American Board of Pathology (ABPath) was pleased to provide diplomates an electronic certification mark for use in their emails, websites, print materials, and social media. The certification mark identifies a physician as board certified by ABPath. The use of this mark informs the public that a physician meets the certification standards established by the ABPath and is committed to providing excellence in patient care. It is available as a free download through ABPath's PATHway for diplomates.

## New Retired Status for Diplomates

Certification with an ABMS member board is a significant achievement. ABPath wished to continue recognizing physicians as diplomates after they stopped actively practicing medicine and no longer wanted to maintain their medical license and certifications. Retired status can be requested from ABPath by any current diplomate. Eligibility for Retired status can be found in the Continuing Certification (CC) Booklet of Information. Opting into the Retired status publicly lists the physician as Retired. Physicians listed as Retired no longer need to hold a medical license or participate in ABPath's Continuing Certification Program to remain a diplomate of ABPath.

# CertLink®

## The Growth of ABPath CertLink®

2019 was a pivotal year for ABPath CertLink® (ABPCL), the online longitudinal assessment pilot program. ABPCL's innovative approach has shown that there is a better way of knowledge assessment for Continuing Certification that allows for continuous learning in pathology.

The hard launch of the pilot began in 2018 and we currently have over 9,450 participants. ABPath is one of many member boards of the American Board of Medical Specialties that were piloting a longitudinal assessment program. Based on its success, ABPCL will become the preferred method to assess knowledge and promote learning and excellence in pathology. Beginning January 2021, ABPCL will be a permanent alternative to the once every 10-year exam for the Part III Assessment of Knowledge, Judgment, and Skills requirement for CC.

During the testing phase, we encouraged and used feedback from diplomates to refine the platform to create a user-friendly experience for busy physicians. The response from diplomates was enthusiastic and they found it to be a meaningful and relevant assessment. A user survey showed 95% of respondents prefer to take a longitudinal assessment like ABPCL over the Part III exam.

Participants appreciate the convenience to log in anytime to answer 15 new multiple-choice questions per quarter (q 3 months). In this assessment design,

diplomates have 5 minutes to answer the question with access to any resources except another person. They receive immediate feedback about their response, a critique about the topic, and references. A personalized dashboard provides performance status to the participant and comparisons to their peers.

This dynamic platform helps identify knowledge gaps and provides feedback and resources to fill those gaps for pathologists in all stages of their career. As science is rapidly changing, this type of assessment enables us to incorporate new content and questions that are relevant to the current work of pathologists. We look forward to entering this new phase of Continuing Certification with ABPCL.

# 2019 Board Actions

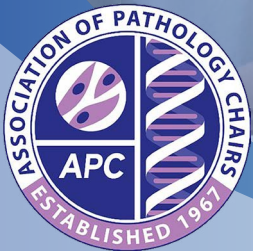

## Earning CME/SAM for ABPath CertLink® Participation

Diplomates participating in ABPath CertLink® (ABPCL) can now claim up to 5 SAM-eligible CME credits for their participation each year. Credits are claimed through the American Society for Clinical Pathology (ASCP) in collaboration with the American Board of Pathology (ABPath). Diplomates do not have to be a member of ASCP to claim these credits. Credits for 2019 can be claimed up until December 31, 2020 and will be applied to the next Continuing Certification (CC) reporting form (2020 or 2021 depending on your initial certification year). Credit is 1.25 hours per completed quarter, which is defined as attempting all questions assigned by ABPCL for that quarter. There is a \$19 processing fee payable to ASCP to receive your CME/ SAM credits and transcript. You may choose to have your credits automatically appear in your ABPath PATHway account through ACCME PARS at no additional cost. Additional information is available [HERE](#).

## ACCME Program and Activity Reporting System (PARS)

The American Board of Pathology (ABPath) partnered with the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to create an automated process for reporting a pathologist's AMA PRA Category I CME (including SAMs) to the ABPath for our Continuing Certification Program. The ACCME Program and Activity Reporting System (PARS) provides tracking of completed CMEs in a diplomate's PATHway account. Once a CME activity is completed, with a pathologist's one-time permission and their ABPath ID#, an accredited CME provider that is participating in PARS will report this information to ACCME, which is then sent on to ABPath.

The CME credits will automatically show in the diplomate's CC reporting form in PATHway, beginning with 2019 CC reporting forms. A transcript of CME credits reported via PARS is available for download as primary source documentation for medical licensure and credentialing. As an additional benefit of this partnership, diplomates can search for CME activities by credit type (CME, SAM, and Improvement in Medical Practice [Part IV]), provider, key word, and practice area in ACCME's CME Finder (<http://www.cmefinder.org/>). **Harmonization of Training, Training Requirements, Board Certification, and Practice of Hematopathology**

**ABSTRACT**

**Objective:** Hematopathology (HP) is a rapidly changing field with insufficient data to provide guidance to program directors (PDs), the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education, or the American Board of Pathology.

**Methods:** Two surveys were performed—one for HP PDs and one, given twice, for HP diplomates about Maintenance of Certification/Continuing Certification reporting in 2017 to 2018.

**Results:** Bone marrow (BM), lymph node (LN), and flow cytometry interpretations and peripheral blood/urine reviews are performed by more than 80% of hematopathologists and are the areas with the greatest amount of training. A smaller proportion of hematopathologists is involved in other HP-related activities. Most PDs believed fellows should perform BM procedures. Interpretation of 400 or more LNs and 500 BMs was PDs' median expectations for fellows. PDs and HP diplomates considered acquisition and usage RBC disorders overemphasized on the certification examination.

**Conclusions:** These results highlight how varied the practice of HP is and can provide guidance to HP PDs, those responsible for assessing HP programs, and the American Board of Pathology.

The field of hematopathology (HP) is ever-changing with an exploding knowledge base, increasing ancillary tools rapidly entering clinical practice, newer therapeutic strategies that may require the identification of specific targets, newer prognostic indicators that hematopathologists can provide, and the 2016/2017 World Health Organization (WHO) classification of tumors of hematopoietic and lymphoid tissues that has new requirements for what hematopathologists need to look for and provide to clinicians. These ongoing changes create major challenges for training hematopathologists and establishing training requirements, particularly given the fixed, 1-year duration of HP fellowships. It also creates challenges for having a certification examination that is fair to trainees and leads to board certification only for those who are deemed competent, fulfilling the American Board of Pathology mission "to serve the public and advance the profession of pathology by setting certification standards and promoting lifelong competency of pathologists." An additional complication that affects all of the above is how varied the practice of HP has become. To some, it is a field that includes complex complication testing interpretation and consultation or active participation in the latest molecular tests, but to others, these areas are not an integral part of what defines a hematopathologist. Despite these many well-known challenges, very few data are available to use when deciding how to address these issues. A detailed and lengthy recommended curriculum for HP fellows was published over a decade ago; however, it provided limited guidance as to how the 12 months of a 1-year fellowship should be divided and is now out of date.<sup>1</sup> Practice and training surveys

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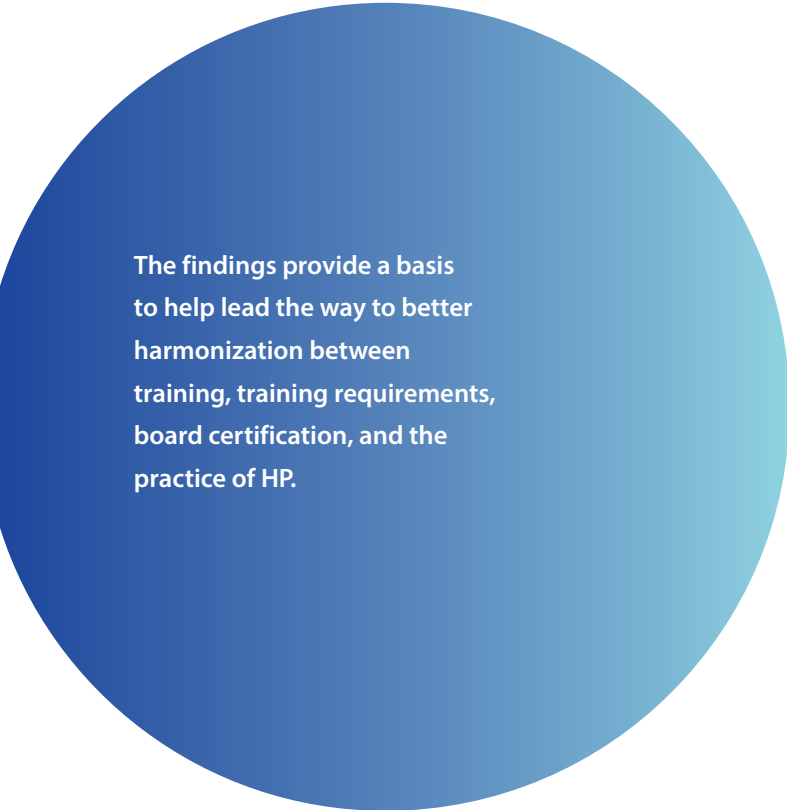

Surveys of ABPath diplomates and Hematopathology (HP) fellowship directors assessed current practice and training in HP. The practice of HP has under-gone major changes over time and there was a paucity of data that could provide guidance to HP program directors (for training), to the ACGME Pathology Residency Review Committee (for accreditation of fellowship programs and program requirements), and to the ABPath for certification in HP. The findings provide objective data for further discussion among the major stakeholders so that training, practice, and board certification in HP can be more closely aligned.



The findings provide a basis to help lead the way to better harmonization between training, training requirements, board certification, and the practice of HP.



## Conclusions

Despite some limitations, the survey of HP program directors and the two surveys of “recent” diplomates with very consistent results provide data that can be useful for guiding the development of HP fellowship curricula, in assessing expected volumes and training in HP fellowships, and as a basis for more objective decisions about what to emphasize on the HP certifying examination. Taken together, findings from the surveys are consistent with the premise that while the field of HP is expanding and while there are areas practiced by a relatively small proportion of hematopathologists, no areas should be totally deleted from HP training, practice, or certification. Some of the findings have already been used to help assess HP programs and alter the distribution of questions on the HP certifying examination. Finally, the findings provide a basis to help lead the way to better harmonization between training, training requirements, board certification, and the practice of HP, an important goal leading to the competent practice of HP. They also create a more complete picture of HP practice for those considering this subspecialty.

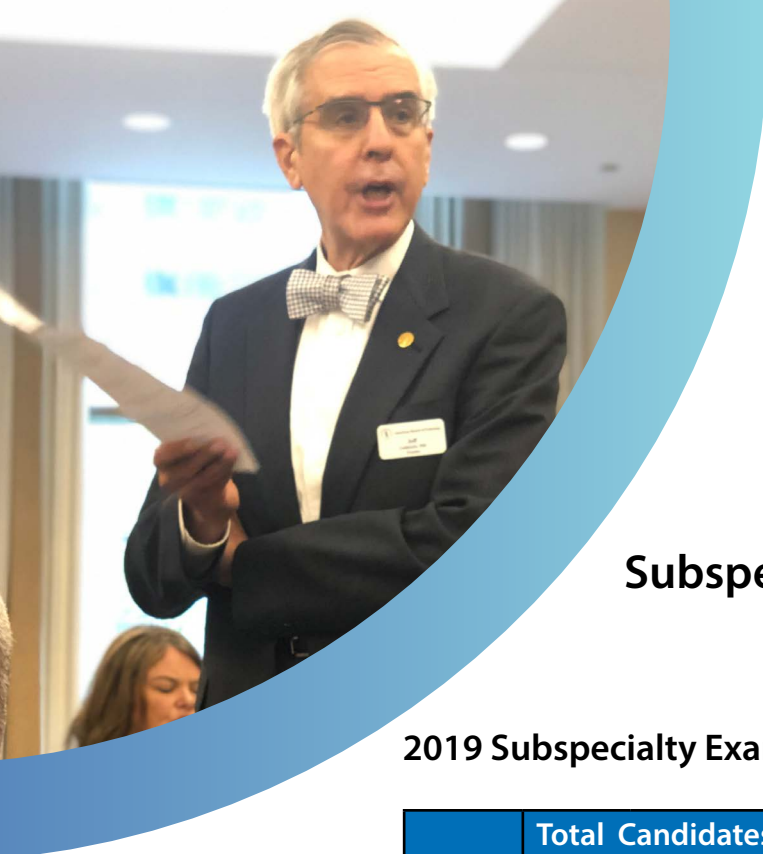

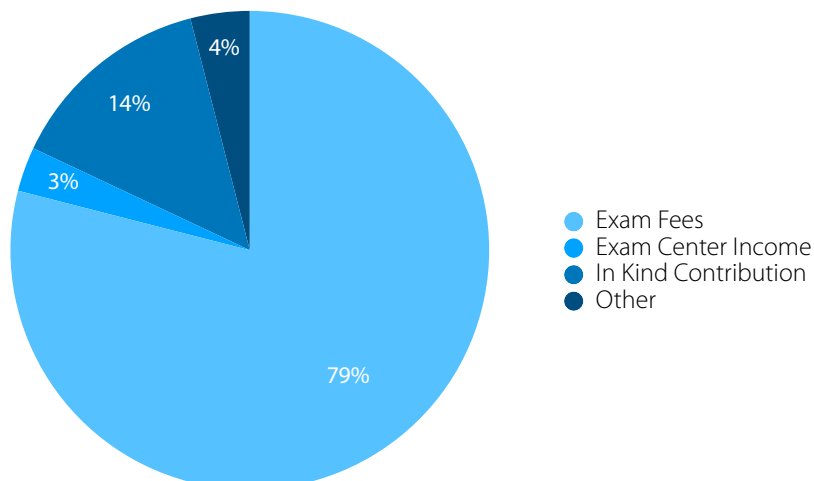

## Revenue

ABPath revenue is generated from several sources. Examination fees are for the preparation and administration of Primary, Subspecialty and Continuing Certification exams. The ABPath Exam Center is rented by three other boards for delivering their exams each year.

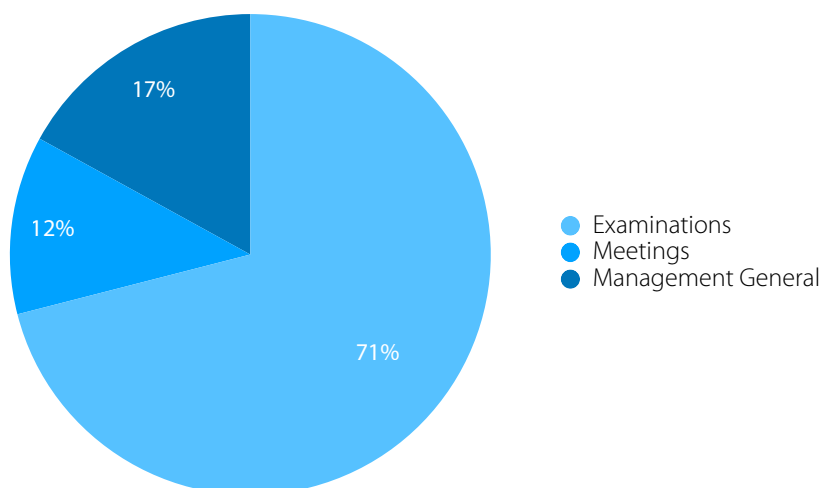
Examination questions are written by volunteer pathologists. Per the IRS, their services must be reported as an In-kind Contribution (equivalent time a pathologist would be paid had they charged for these services).





## Expenses

Examination expenses cover the cost of credentialing candidates; the development, administration and scoring of the exams; reporting results, and maintaining the Continuing Certification program, including ABPath CertLink®. Meeting expenses include the travel and administrative expenses for volunteer test committee members and Trustees. Management and general expenses include employee salaries, benefits, insurance, information technology support and licensing, facility and equipment rental and maintenance, ABMS member fees, and the cost of providing services to our diplomates such as ABPath CertLink, ACCME PARS, and remote Continuing Certification examinations.

The ABPath is governed by 12 physician members and one public member. Each member is highly esteemed and accomplished in their respective fields and/or subspecialty.

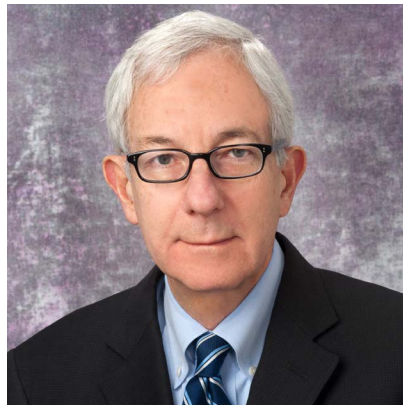

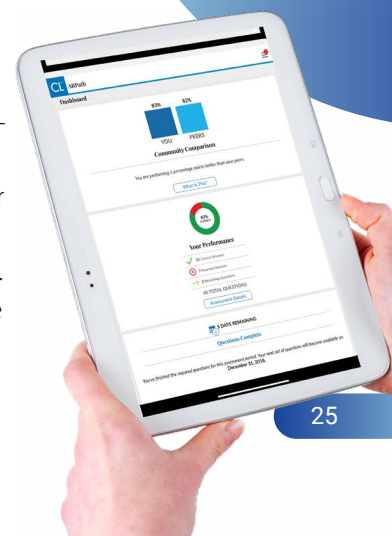
